## Sociology/Linguistics 366.1 Field Methods in Socio-Linguistics 2003-2004

## Introduction

The objectives of this course, together with its sequel, SOC/LIN 367.2, are to introduce students to the techniques, purposes and problems of collecting linguistic and socio-linguistic data in the field. Students will learn through actual practice, how to describe a language and its variation and use. In the first semester (SOC/LIN 366.1) students are introduced in the classroom situation to recording linguistic data, first from English speakers, and subsequently from speakers of languages they do not yet know.

In the first semester, students are introduced to the experience and objectives of field work, followed by an introduction to articulatory phonetics and its recording. Students practice transcribing sounds and eventually entire words. From the phonetic level, students learn how to construct a phonological system for a language and how to devise a set of symbols for its representation. Lexical information is collected in the context of the grammar of the language. Techniques will be demonstrated and practiced for discovering the morphology and syntactical principles governing the language.

Most work will be done in class, by students in the course of exercises. Attendance is obligatory, and work missed cannot be made up. Classes missed because of illness will require a medical excuse. There will be two in-class tests during the term, one at mid-term of the year and one during the final week. Students will submit in writing the results of exercises done during and outside of class. Marking will be on the basis of attendance, participation in class exercises, tests, and written work.
